ICA NOTES

Alberto Giacometti

With the death of Alberto Giacometti we have lost another of the great creative personalities of this century Thanks to the exhibition at the Tate last summer we are now more familiar with his haunting figures that surround themselves in air and move through the wide busy spaces of our imagination. They are at the same time reminders of our meagre grasp of life and of the dominance of the human presence in a changing world. preoccupation throughout all his work, sculpture, drawin and painting, was to penetrate into the nature of reality and it is this desire that constitutes a continuous thread throughout and links the early work in which the fantasies of the subconcious allied him to the surrealists and the post-war period when he decided that there is such mystery in the appearance of things that surround us that he had no need to explore deliberately the more obscure realms of dreams or rather that no division can be made between the dream and reality.

As an artist his work will live but as a man and a friend he is lost to us. His unique and passionate way of living, the astonishing originality of his conversation and his gaunt and dishevelled appearance, often heavily powdered with the plaster with which he had been working all night, made him a rare and very loveable friend. The ICA have more than once been grateful to him for his generosity. The portraits of Peter Watson, one of our founders and benefactors, were given to the Institute by him as a sign of his great affection for Peter and because he wished to be intimately associated with us and prove his enthusiasm for our activities.

The Anonima Group

The three members of the group, Ernst Benkert, Francis Hewitt and Edwin Mieczkowski, began meeting on an informal basis in 1959 to exchange ideas and to plan work. From the beginning the importance of rejecting informalism or Abstract Expressionism was agreed upon. The spirit of the early abstract movement and the work of such artists as El Lissitzky, Malevich and Mondrian seemed relevant, and so did the psychology of visual perception. There never was any question of turning from two dimensional painting to three dimensional construction. Month-long meetings for concentrated work and more formal exchanges and discussions began in 1960 and have taken place each year since then. After their first exhibition in 1962 the group decided to exhibit in the future only as a group, and in their own gallery whenever possible. They have now opened a workshop-gallery in New York where they will exhibit their own work and that of other groups.

The group has published two issues of a magazine which they hope will attract participation on an international basis. The next issue will be published this spring with contributions from England, Poland and Italy as well as the US.

Antoni Miraldi
